#### Jesus, have mercy on us!



# Featured Schoenstatter: Father Robert Goblirsch



This coming October 3, 2016, will be the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Dedication of the Schoenstatt Shrine in Sleepy Eye, Minnesota. A resounding "thank you" ascends to heaven, especially to our MTA for choosing a "beautiful place" and for arranging all the instruments needed in God's loving plan to accomplish this task.

Father Robert Goblirsch was the pastor at St John Cantius in Wilno from September 30, 1970, to June 18, 1986, and from July 15, 1977, the Sts Peter and Paul Parish in Ivanhoe was added to his duties. He recalls discussing the wish for a Schoenstatt Shrine with Sister Mariette, who was hospital administrator at the Divine Providence Hospital and Home in Ivanhoe. His opinion was no, Wilno would be too small and the future didn't look bright to sustain such a permanent endeavor. He suggested going to a lake where there would always be interest.

Life continued on and he was next actively involved on the evening of December 7, 1974. The Schoenstatt Family had prepared to crown the MTA picture for the future Minnesota shrine by Bishop Schadweiler. Father Goblirsch pointed out that he only thought of it that evening – to seriously ask and check out the diocesan land at Sleepy Eye – as here was the Bishop himself, the Schoenstatt Sister who could take care of the paperwork, and the dream which Father Stephen Adrian had shared with him about finding a group of nuns who could care for the diocesan farm bordering Lake Sleepy Eye.

"I have to admit, I myself didn't think it would ever work out so well!" said Fr Goblirsch at an interview on April 14, 2016. He was happy to be instrumental in suggesting to the first Bishop of the Diocese of New Ulm that perhaps some land could be given to the Schoenstatt Sisters of Mary for building their shrine and training center.

Forty years later we can see the creative resultant of divine powers supplementing the human smallness and difficulties to acquire the land. Many priests have given selflessly to allow hearts and souls to be led heavenwards from this 32-acre paradise. We are grateful to the Diocese of New Ulm.

## An Experience of a Lifetime

I would like to share with you about my trip to Rome for the closing of the Year of Consecrated Life from January 25-February 6, 2016. It's hard to describe the countless workings of the Holy Spirit when 5,000 consecrated women and men from 100 countries met for six days at the Heart of the Church, climaxing with meeting Pope

Francis.

The theme of the world symposium was: Consecrated Life in Communion – the common foundation in the diversity of the forms. Through talks, prayers, meetings, and conversations seven groups shared in plenary and individual sessions with schedules going from 7:45 am until 7:30 pm. The seven forms of consecrated life are: Order of Virgins, Monastic Cloistered Life, Religious Institutes of Apostolic Life, Male Monastic Life, Societies of Apostolic Life, Secular Institutes, and New Institutes and Forms.

Sister Marcia (who worked with the Minnesota Movement from 1976-1986) is the president of the US Conference of Secular Institutes and I have been serving as secretary for many years. We were joined by the vice president from Detroit and the treasurer from San Francisco area and were able to stay at the place run by the Daughters of Charity. Their House Mary Immaculate is a 20-minute walk from the Vatican, with fantastic hospitality. Four other Schoenstatters attended the meeting.

Security was tight and lines were very long and time consuming to enter Vatican City, so it was lovely to walk past the huge Christmas crèche at St Peter's Square. Each year the display, complete with a huge Christmas tree, is presented by a different Italian city. In addition to the Holy Family and three kings, corporal works of mercy were viewed in a father leading his child to the crib, a woman bringing cloth, a friend feeding a sick person, etc. I enjoyed the rooster and cat among the sheep and ox.

The opening prayer vigil and closing Mass were in St Peter's. Our first day was a joint session, transmitted in



seven languages, at Paul VI Hall, shown above. We heard inspiring talks by the Prefect, his Eminence Cardinal Joao Braz de Aviz, and Secretary, Archbishop Jose Rodriguez Carballo, OFM, serving the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life (CICLSAL). Lectures by Fr Theobald, SJ, Mother Maria Ignazia Angelini, OSB, and Fr Calle, OCD, highlighted contemplation as a way for all consecrated members to best serve their apostolates.



Lunches were a great time to meet the other 425 secular institute members, as this was the first time our form of consecration was invited to this gathering.



#### **Meeting Pope Francis February 1 & 2**



One of the breathtaking moments came as I was walking to the audience, and with heavenly precision, a lead organizer for Secular Institutes came from another door and said "I need two." We were whisked behind a Swiss Guard to the 3<sup>rd</sup> row for a great view and to actually shake hands with Pope Francis!



Sister M Marcia was seated with General Superiors and heads of conferences as she represented all USA Insitutes and could share our MTA with Christ's Vicar at the audience.



Father Kentenich promised Pope Pius XII in 1947 as secular institutes began, that Schoenstatt's five institutes would help lead and serve the Church faithfully in this new form of consecration. Evelyn and Sister Jessica met a couple from France in the 3<sup>rd</sup> row.

## **Three Key Pillars from Pope Francis**

In his freely spoken audience at mid-day February 1, 2016, we heard about **prophecy**, closeness, and hope.

An obedience that is not military, no; that is discipline, it is something else. It is the obedience of giving one's heart. And this is **prophecy**... Prophecy means telling people that there is a road of happiness, greatness, a road that fills you with joy, that is indeed Jesus' way. It is the road of being close to Jesus. Prophecy is a gift, it is a charism that must be asked for from the Holy Spirit; that I might know how to say that word, at the right moment; that I do the right thing at the right moment; that all my life may be a prophecy.

In thinking about **closeness**, men and women are consecrated, not to distance themselves from people, and to live in comfort; no, to become closer and to understand the life of Christians and non-Christians, their suffering, their problems. Consecrated life must lead us to physical and spiritual closeness, to knowing the people. Who is the person closest — his brother or her sister in the community. Don't alienate people by the terrorism of gossip. St James said that the most difficult human and spiritual virtue to have is that of controlling one's tongue. Say your problems in the right way and at the right place.

Hope: I see the decline in vocations and I am tempted to ask, against hope, "Lord, why has the womb of consecrated life become so barren?" We must pray more and pray tirelessly. We must knock on the door of His heart. Don't become attached to money as your group becomes smaller. Hope comes only from the Lord – money will never give you this.

I thank you for what you do. What would the Church be without nuns? When you go to a cemetery, we must ask the Lord to look at these saints, these seeds, and to give us more vocations, because we need them. —Excerpts via Vatican Radio

That evening we enjoyed the Oratorio "On Beauty's Trail," composed and directed by Monsignor Marco Frisina in the Paul VI hall. This was magnificent: an orchestra of the Diocese of Rome of about 50 persons, a choir of 140, and 14 ballet dancers. Words of scripture and quotes from various founders and foundresses of different time periods were interspersed. Colored lights with white fog shifted to match the theme of the music. It was a marvelous climax to our time together and in the best sense a prayer of beauty.

On February 2, the feast of Candlemas and World Day for Consecrated Life, there were Holy Year pilgrimages planned to the other major basilicas in the morning. The evening Mass in St. Peter's Basilica with Pope Francis for the closing of the Year of Consecrated Life was the highlight and last event of our conference. Sister M Marcia was able to be in the entrance procession carrying a tall candle, along with others representing various forms of consecrated life.

Before we flew back to Newark, we took a taxi to the *Cor Ecclesiae* Shrine. It was so beautiful to pray there at our sisters shrine, literally in the shadow of St Peter's. We must dream big with our founder about the future of our secular institutes in the USA and around the globe. *–Sister M Jessica*


