PROCLAMATION of the FATHER KENTENICH YEAR by BISHOP JOHN M. LEVOIR








On this twenty-second day of October, in the year of our Lord two thousand seventeen,
In the one hundred third year of the existence of the Schoenstatt covenant of love,
In the sixtieth year of the establishment of the Diocese of New Ulm,
In the forty-first year since the dedication of the Jubilee Family Shrine in Sleepy Eye, Minnesota,
and the forty-ninth year since the founder, Reverend Joseph Kentenich, was called home to eternal life,

I do solemnly proclaim the opening of the Father Kentenich Year in the Diocese of New Ulm in keeping with the intention of the International Schoenstatt Family.

Now, therefore I, the Most Reverend John M. LeVoir, Bishop of the Diocese of New Ulm, grant a partial indulgence to all those who visit this Schoenstatt Shrine of the Mother Thrice Admirable Queen and Victress of Schoenstatt, until September 15, 2018, in conjunction with the Schoenstatt Movement's Jubilee Year commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Death of their Founder, Servant of God, Father Joseph Kentenich, and who meet the normal requirements to receive an indulgence.

Furthermore, I encourage you as spiritual children of Father Kentenich to commit to sharing his charism and asking for the grace of apostolic zeal and fruitfulness in order to share his message with the whole Church.





HE LOVED THE CHURCH

Father Joseph Kentenich was born at Gymnich near Cologne, Germany, on November 16, 1885. When he was nine he consecrated himself to the Mother of God. This consecration meant so much to him that he later confessed: "I owe everything I am and whatever has come into existence in Schoenstatt to Our Lady."

In 1910, he was ordained to the priesthood. In 1912, he was called to Schoenstatt as the spiritual director of the Pallottine Minor Seminary. On October 18, 1914, he entered into a covenant of love with Our Lady, asking her to make Schoenstatt a place of grace. It was to this place and into this covenant of love that he led people.

The guidance of Divine Providence convinced him that he was called to form men and women according to the example of Mary. These were the people who would be able to build a new Christian social order in a new epoch. In the years that followed, Father Kentenich proved to be endowed both with the genius and the grace of educating and forming others. He became the father and founder of an international movement for priests and laity.

He was subjected to two severe trials: from 1941-45 in a Gestapo prison and concentration camp at Dachau; and from 1949-65 he was tested by the Holy See. For 14 years he was separated from his foundation and stayed in Wisconsin. This was a time in which his love for and loyalty to the Church proved itself. After an audience with Pope Paul VI he returned to finish his work with undiminished strength and calm.

God called him on September 15, 1968, after saying Mass in the Adoration Church at Schoenstatt. He is buried where he died with *Dilexit Ecclesiam* inscribed on this tomb: He loved the Church. Many people pray for and have received help and answers via his intercession.

I value all that we learn about childlikeness, instrumentality, everyday sanctity, Divine Providence, self-education, training for sainthood, etc.

One thing that has been a special joy, though, has been to be able to be a part of the MN Leader's Circle. We get to meet with Sister M Faustina and (hopefully!) help her out to the best of our abilities. Mostly it has been things related to camp or weekends - whether it's assisting in planning or writing meditations, skits, opening/closing prayers and so on. Also, this summer some of us were able to go to Wisconsin for the National Leaders' Convention, where we got to work together to choose this year's motto, "Your Heart is my Living Foundation!" It was so lovely to meet other girls from all over the USA, and it was really cool how we all were just able to work together so well.

A goal that I would have for the Schoenstatt Youth this year, besides to live out of our motto, is: to foster our relationship with the three contact points, most especially our relationship with Father Kentenich. This is our year of preparation for the 50th anniversary of his death! And, as one of the sisters told us after we formulated the motto: Think of how beautiful it would be if, by the time the day comes, September 15, 2018, the day when Father's physical heart failed him - we can offer a whole array of hearts, flaming with love, who will carry on his work.

"WE ARE SURROUNDED BY SO GREAT A CLOUD OF WITNESSES." (HEB 12:1)

God gives us many role models in our faith journey – role models in our everyday life, and also the many saints. We as men have a great role model in Saint Joseph. At least one litany of Saint Joseph includes the title, "Terror of Demons," and that is a role that each man truly must embrace, regardless his state in life. We all have at least one person in our life – maybe a family member or a friend – who struggles spiritually and whom we can help by becoming our own Terror of Demons.

That's easy to say but not so easy to make happen. How do we become someone who can intimidate demons?

"IRON IS SHARPENED BY IRON; ONE PERSON SHARPENS ANOTHER." (PRV 27:17)

Athletes work out on their own, but truly reaching the pinnacle of a sport requires working out with another. Long-distance runners certainly do a lot of running, probably much of it on their own. But they also benefit greatly from working out with others. Runners can be cheerleaders for each other, but also challenge them by pushing each other. And there is great camaraderie in working out with others, where no one will judge you for falling short but instead will help you through difficulties.

How does that translate to our faith life? We work out on our own through our private prayer and spiritual practices, which are vital to a strong faith life. But truly reaching out pinnacle requires working out with another. **And that – the thought of sharing our faith journey with another – is very difficult for men.** Fear of public speaking, of dying, of heights (my personal "favorite") – these all pale in comparison to the fear and loathing of sharing details of our faith journey. But that's what we need to do in order to reach our pinnacle, to become a Terror of Demons along the lines of Saint Joseph.

"Where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." (Mt 18:20)

Schoenstatt is no stranger to strengthening men. In fact, living out Schoenstatt spirituality is in many ways following the example of Saint Joseph. He was married to Mary (meaning that they had a covenant relationship) "and took his wife into his home." (Mt 1:24). We follow in the footsteps of Saint Joseph in Schoenstatt when we make our Covenant of Love with the MTA – we have our own covenant relationship with Mary. We follow Saint Joseph further by creating our Home Shrine – we invite Mary to come live in our homes. This is part of our spiritual workout on our own or with our wife. But there is also the need for spiritual workouts with other men.

From the very start, Schoenstatt included groups of men sharing their faith journey, strengthening each other. We as men need to continue tapping into this source of strength, of becoming the best we can be. A great way to do that is through couples' groups, which are a great way of sharing and growing in faith. But perhaps, for many men, complementing the couples' group meeting with men's meetings, where men share with men, would help men open up more.

What would these men's meetings look like? First off, the meetings shouldn't look like the couples' meetings. **It should be full of things that prompt men to be introspective** – maybe an adult beverage or two, a bonfire, being outdoors, or starting the meeting with a round of golf, a service project, some type of physical work, in order to tire the body somewhat. Maybe plan a meeting of the men from the couples' group or a men's retreat. Find a way to plant a small mustard seed, and watch the MTA and her Son make it grow.

Resolution: Have a weekly spiritual workout. Some ideas include:

- * Spend 15 minutes in your home shrine, or start a home shrine if you don't have one.
- * Revisit and renew (on your own or with your spouse) your covenant of love with the MTA. Or start the path toward making your covenant of love.
- * For men, contact the men in your couples' group or other Catholic men that you know. Organize a men's faith gettogether. Maybe a weekend retreat or a parish event. Maybe a few guys enjoying a fire and sharing their faith journeys.
